## **NONAGENARIAN SERIES**

This month's honoree is **Marjorie Tsipuras (nee Pritchard).**

Marjorie was born in Pontypridd on May 16, 1915 at a time when it was forbidden to speak Welsh in the schools. As a result, both of Marjorie's parents spoke English only as did Marjorie although her grandmother spoke a little Welsh at home. Marjorie's mother, Ellen, was a teacher and her father, John, ran a confectionary shop in Pontypridd.

In 1920, Marjorie's uncle, a mine superintendent, was tragically killed in an accident in the coal mine. Her father who was with his brother-in-law on an inspection in the mine was spared. Although not seriously injured physically, the emotional trauma resulting from this tragedy caused Marjorie's father to decide on a move to Scranton, Pennsylvania where two of his sisters and many Welsh miners had already settled.

Marjorie, her brother and her mother followed her father to Scranton several months later. Marjorie's mother was 'more than reluctant' to leave her native land of Wales and when the family of three left the Pontypridd train station, a large number of the townspeople sang, "God Be With You 'Til We Meet Again" as the train departed. For the 2007 Good Friday Gymanfa Ganu, when asked along with other octogenarians to choose a favourite hymn, Marjorie answered without hesitation that she wanted to hear 'God Be With You'. This is a seminal memory of her childhood in Wales.

In Scranton, Marjorie's parents opened 'The Golden Rule' bakery, Her mother could not pursue her career as a teacher since married women were not allowed to teach in those days. The family became totally immersed in Bradley Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church with its large Welsh congregation; there her mother taught Sunday School and her father was superintendent. Marjorie has been involved in a number of roles within her home churches ever since that time. When she was ten years old, Marjorie became ill with rheumatic fever and spent six months in bed.

In 1931, during the depression, Marjorie's family moved to New York City where the family worshipped at Featherbed Lane Presbyterian Church in an area of the

city made famous during the American Revolution. Unfortunately, Marjorie suffered a severe relapse of rheumatic fever and her formal schooling was impossible to pursue through recurring bouts of this illness. The silver lining in this cloud was that Marjorie became a voracious reader, a hobby she pursues to the present day. Marjorie's stay in New York City lasted eight years; by the end of this time she had become a beautician in an upscale Broadway salon. It was the love of a young man from Montreal that brought Marjorie to Canada and her new life. Marjorie's husband, John, was a Greek Canadian who attended both the universities of McGill and Concordia from which he graduated with a degree in chemistry. After a five year engagement, Marjorie and John had two wedding ceremonies; one in the Greek Orthodox church in New York and one in Featherbed Lane Presbyterian church the following day. Marjorie explains, "in this way, both families were satisfied that we were properly married!" Their married life began in Montreal where her husband was employed by British American Oil. Work with this company brought them to Clarkson, Ontario for seven years, but eventually the family returned to Montreal. By this time the family had expanded to include two sons, Dennis and Christopher (sadly died in 1968) and two daughters, Risti and Joanna. Risti Jensen, Marjorie's oldest daughter, is an active member of Dewi Sant and a valued chorister in Merched Dewi.

After retirement in 1991, Marjorie and John moved to Wellington, Ontario where Marjorie was involved in Wellington United Church. After her husband's death in 2001, she moved to Toronto to be nearer to her daughters and it was at this time that Marjorie became a regular attendee at Dewi Sant, although she had previously attended services when visiting family in Toronto and many years earlier she had donated an afghan to a Dewi Sant auction that she had read about in the Ninnau.

Marjorie's life has been filled with volunteer service. Being married into a European family that felt a woman's place was not in the work force, Marjorie used her time fruitfully in the care of her family and in volunteer work, much of it centred around her leadership roles in the various churches she has attended. She also volunteered for the war effort through her work with the Canadian Red Cross and the Greek Canadian Red Cross.

Learning to knit in New York some eighty years ago, Marjorie has made literally thousands of teddy bears for the Teddies for Tragedies organization and for Sleeping Children Around the World. This is an ongoing project and as a proud owner of one of these teddy bears, I can attest to her continuing skill in both crocheting and knitting.

Interestingly, an e-mail enquiry to [info@dewisant.com](mailto:info@dewisant.com) in March 2009 requested knowledge of Marjorie Tsipuras. Gill Jones, the woman making the enquiry thought that Dewi Sant, the only Welsh church in Canada, might know of Marjorie's whereabouts. From subsequent e-mails, it evolved that Gill's great grandmother and Marjorie's grandmother were sisters. Dewi's Sant's role as a Welsh centre of connection has once again been confirmed.

Raising her talented family which now includes three grandsons and two granddaughters, volunteering in her church and community, cooking, knitting
