"Just a Minute with Dewi Sant"

For the 100th Anniversary of Dewi Sant, there was a concert by the Welsh Male Voice Choir. I sat behind Cerwyn Davies and Sheryl Clay Newell, and heard Cerwyn talking about being a Welsh Bard.

By the time my Dad was three months old both his parents had died and his aunt and uncle took on the huge task of caring for Dad, his brother and sister. This uncle, David Glanamen Jones, was a Welsh minister at the chapel in Pontadawe and a poet and had won 11 out of 13 Eisteddfods. In those days, the winner was awarded a "Bardic Chair" and our family had been given 3: Dad's was in the chapel and I had 2 at home.

I had already decided to leave my chairs to Dewi Sant when I died, but when I heard Cerwyn talk, I decided that as the chairs were dated 1906 and 1908, and here we were in 2007 celebrating a 100th anniversary, the chairs



should go NOW to the church. I am so pleased my two Bardic Chairs have a special home at the chancel of Dewi Sant.

My memory focus today is on 'the bus'. Buses (the plural use here is accurate) arrived every Good Friday afternoon at Dewi Sant for many years (both on Clinton and the early years on Melrose) carrying members of the Welsh diaspora in Southern Ontario to the annual Gymanfa Ganu. So many attended yearly that chairs had to be set up in the aisles (against fire regulations I am sure) and there were two seatings for dinner. The Welsh came to raise their voices in worship and song and to rekindle memories of their homeland.

I remember the annual bus trip in June to our Sunday School picnic held at an out of town park. It engendered great excitement at a time when travel was much more limited than it is today.

More recently there was our bus trip organized by Donna Morris during our centennial celebration that highlighted the role of the Welsh in the cultural and financial life of Toronto over many years. Stay tuned for a repeat performance this year!

Who would believe it! BUSES....the stuff of dreams and memories.....

NONAGENARIAN SERIES CONTINUES

VAUGHAN LEWIS

This month's honoree, Vaughan Lewis, was born on September 19, 1926, at his maternal grandmother's home (a normal practice at the time) in Pontardawe. Raised in Llanelli, Vaughan attended the local elementary school and the county grammar school in that area. English being the language of instruction at school (though the Lewis family had spoken Welsh since the mid 1700's) he was raised in English. Vaughn's family decided that he should leave school prematurely and join a firm where he trained as a draftsman. He lived through the dreadful bombings of Swansea and eventually returned to school there to complete his Higher Nationals very successfully.

Vaughan married his first wife Megan when he was 22 but the travel bug had already struck. Although his preferred destination at that time was New Zealand, those plans were aborted when he needed to provide a sponsor there. After the birth of his first (of four) daughters in Wales, Vaughan was offered a job in Montreal by Dominion Bridge. Amusingly, the gentleman who interviewed him at Canada House in London suggested to Vaughan that his accent was so thick that he could barely understand him. However, the offer was made and the family of three relocated to Canada where the family grew with the birth of three more daughters in Lachine, Quebec. After two years with Dominion Bridge, Vaughan moved to Royal Trust where he worked for 26 years (and has a gold watch to prove it!).

Eventually Vaughan made his way to Toronto (after a one year stint in Ottawa) but was unaware of the existence of Dewi Sant until he heard someone mention it in the supermarket. He and Megan investigated and eventually became members while Cerwyn Davies was the minister. Megan and Vaughan were married for 57 years; Megan passed away after a stroke. During their years of membership in Dewi Sant, they were committed attendees of the weekly services. Vaughan served on the Boards of Session and Stewards and was for a brief period the treasurer of the church.



Eleven years ago, Vaughan married his present wife, Sally, whom he had met at the WNGGA Festival in Buffalo. Sally relocated from Atlanta to Toronto where they have both been actively involved in the life of Dewi Sant. (Ironically both Megan and Sally originally arrived in Canada on the same boat and on the same date but five years apart.) Vaughan and Sally, as regular attendees, both applaud the Lunch Bunch from which they have derived much pleasure. When Vaughan was asked why a man raised as an

Anglican choir boy had decided to join Dewi Sant WUC after his arrival in Toronto, he replied very quickly, 'Because it had a sense of life'. Following up on the answer, he added, 'I still can't think of a better place to attend'.

Diolch yn fawr iawn Vaughan for your long service to Dewi Sant. Your continuing loyalty to the church is applauded by your many friends in the congregation.

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activities? Your action might give other people ideas and help the church make decision about where to put their support.

We are also continuing our **Take a Tag for the Food Bank.** At the entry to the church there will be a plate with tags on which the names of certain food items will be indicated. You are asked to take a tag (or more if you wish) and bring that item/s with you to church on the following Sunday. The food is delivered by Rita Hoffman and Mabel Hastings to the Lansing United Church Food Bank which serves over 200 families per month and is a member of the North York Harvest Food Bank. The Food Bank is also in need of financial contributions as they purchase 60% or 6 tons of our required food items each month. The cost of basic food items has increased 15% or more in the past 6 months, and they are buying basic food items at the rate of \$3,000 per month, even at wholesale prices. Please make cheques payable to "Lansing United Church" with the notation "Food Bank" clearly written on the cheque. Cheques can be mailed to Lansing United (49 Bogert Ave., Toronto ON, M2N 1K4) or given to Rita to take there along with the food. If requested, you may receive an income tax charitable donation receipt from Lansing for donations of \$10 or more but you must provide a full name, address and postal code so your receipt can be properly completed and mailed to you.

ONTARIO WELSH FESTIVAL GOLD AWARD, 2017

It is with great delight that the Board of the above organization announces that Betty Cullingworth is the winner of this year's Award. No one is more worthy of this recognition.

Born into a Welsh speaking family in Toronto, Betty has been a faithful member of Dewi Sant Welsh Church since birth. She works tirelessly for our church, being a member of the Board of Session, a past Superintendent of the Sunday School and the organizer of our Centenary Celebrations in 2007.

Betty is the founding director of Merched Dewi - a women's choir that sings entirely in Welsh and participates in the services at Dewi Sant. Merched Dewi also participates in the Ontario Welsh Festival Nosweithiau Llawen and was invited to perform at the

Ottawa St David's Day luncheon in 2016. In 2013 Merched Dewi, under Betty's leadership, performed at the North American Festival of Wales. In 2010 Betty led the choir on a very successful tour of Wales.

She conducts Cymanfaoedd at Dewi Sant and often accompanies, both on the piano and the organ. She organizes any special events such as Nosweithiau Llawen, concerts, and an amazing Black Lights presentation. Whatever work is needed, Betty is the person one can turn to. She is currently involved in the church's Outreach programme and volunteers at the Scott Mission for homeless people in Toronto.

Betty is a long time Board member of the Ontario Welsh Festival, is a Past President and it was she who spearheaded the 50th anniversary of the organization in 2011. The Gold Award - Betty's idea - was inaugurated in 2011 to commemorate our Golden Anniversary. She certainly deserves to be presented with this Gold Award.

If you have ever attended a North American Gymanfa or an Ontario Gymanfa you will be very familiar with Betty. She is the one who tirelessly and cheerfully leads or accompanies the hymn singing at the Afterglows.

In 2013 The North American Festival of Wales was held in Toronto to great success. Who was the local organizer? Betty! She is a past member of their Board and served as Secretary. Betty continues to fully support the organization and attends the annual Festivals.

In addition to her current involvements and interests, she is a past member of the North American Welsh Choir and accompanied them on their overseas tours. She is very much sought as a conductor of cymanfaoedd both here in Canada and also in the United States. She is an excellent ambassador for all matters Welsh here in Toronto, in Ontario and generally in North America.
